Burnt Thicket Theatre tells stories that kindle hopeful change in people's lives. We create theatre events that give audiences a visceral immersion in another human being's lived experience – that "walking in someone else's shoes" is a central part of theatre's power. We believe in empowering artists to make new work; most of our productions are the fruit of script development processes.

Created in 2007 in Calgary, we moved to Saskatoon in 2017 and have performed in 56 cities across Canada. Our 2012 *She Has a Name* national tour impacted audiences from Halifax to Victoria with the struggle against human trafficking. Our productions of *My Little Plastic Jesus* have inspired honest conversation about faith and politics in living rooms from Vancouver Island to the shores of Lake Ontario. In 2021-2022 we produced two fiction podcast series of world premiere plays for the ear. The latest is *We Treaty People*, in which 49 Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists collaborated on 18 episodes exploring truth and reconciliation, now playing on our website and podcast platforms. We recently presented two SK premieres: *New Blood*, which blends the music of Peter Gabriel and Blackfoot tradition to tell Chief Vincent Yellow Old Woman's healing journey, in partnership with Persephone Theatre and Gordon Tootoosis Nikaniwin Theatre; and *The Unplugging* by Yvette Nolan, as part of Live Five's 21st Season this winter.

We believe the sharing of stories that bring awareness and plant seeds for positive social change matters greatly. It only happens through the collaborative faith and effort of a host of artists, donors, sponsors, and supporters, beyond those listed here.

Acknowledging These Lands

The beautiful lands on which we're performing are the traditional meeting grounds and homelands of many First Nations, including the Cree, Saulteaux, Dene, Nakota Sioux, Niitsitapi, Anishinaabeg, Oji-Cree, and Assiniboine, as well as the Homeland of the Métis – lands that are also known as Treaty Six territory, Treaty Four territory, and Treaty Two territory. There are many other First Nations, Métis and Inuit peoples that call these lands home today. We are all Treaty People. It's a good habit we have to acknowledge where we are, and to honour the Indigenous spirit of the treaties, where treaty creates ties of kinship, of belonging together on the land, with commitments of reciprocity and mutual cooperation. But let this be more than words, let us invite you to join us as we lean into the work of learning and reconciliation, coming together in a good way with everyone here, especially in our relations with those who have called this place home since time immemorial. We're grateful for the opportunity to create and perform here, understanding that these places have a rich, living history of Indigenous arts and culture.

Director's Note

Some stories are just so much fun, so meaningful, that you can't help sharing them over and over. We're so grateful to bring *Every Brilliant Thing* to 24 communities across Saskatchewan this season through OSAC's partnership.

Neuropsychologist Rick Hanson says our brains are like velcro for negative thoughts – they stick due to the brain's natural bias – but our brains are like teflon for joyful thoughts, which tend to slide away. We can choose to hold on to a positive thought or experience, and if we savour it consciously for at least fifteen seconds, it will 'imprint' from short-term to long-term memory.

Psychotherapist Hilary Jacobs Hendel teaches a process called The Change Triangle. Instead of avoiding intense emotions (which leaves us stuck, triggered by those blocked feelings), Hendel's approach welcomes them, allowing us receive the many gifts emotions offer, like helpful information and even healing from trauma.

Repeating these kinds of mindfulness over time increases the neural pathways connected with positive experiences. And that grows our capacity for emotional well-being, deep connection with others, and resiliency when facing mental health challenges (which 1 in 3 Canadians experience over their lifetime).

This play cultivates joy without ignoring pain. My breathing is often hampered by anxiety about imagined futures and desolation about the past, but the surprising gift of gratitude in the present is like pure oxygen. To me this story is like a guide walking us through the valley of the shadow and into hope, except the path is actually a hilariously wild rollercoaster.

I pray your experience here generates real, healing connections with the people in your community, and contributes to ending stigma about mental illness in Canada. May you be surprised and inspired by *Every Brilliant Thing*. Buckle up!

RESOURCES IN OUR COMMUNITY

Mental health is more than the absence of a mental health condition or illness: it is a positive sense of well-being, or the capacity to enjoy life and deal with the challenges we face. Below you will find information and resources to help face the challenges to mental health in daily life.

FINDING HELP

Some people worry about asking for help because there can be stigma around mental health problems. They may believe that asking for help means admitting that something is wrong. Some people worry about how others might see them. Asking for help means that you want to make changes or take steps towards your new health goals. We should celebrate the courage it takes to speak up and make changes. Getting help is part of recovery.

BUILDING YOUR TEAM

The first steps may be the toughest, but knowing where to look for help is a good start. Here are good places to begin building your team:

- Talk with supportive friends and family. Share your feelings with them and let them be part of your team.
- Talk to your family doctor. They are a great resource and can link you to other professionals, if needed.
- Connect with community mental health clinics or organizations like the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) for information, support, and services.
- Call a help line. Some organizations also offer support online or through text messaging.
- Learn more about mental health. You can find useful books, websites, and other resources through your provincial or territorial government and community agencies.
- Connect with others who have personal experience with a mental illness and learn more about their recovery journey.
- Attend workshops and education sessions hosted at community centres, agencies, schools, colleges or universities.
- Talk with a member or leader you trust from your faith or cultural group.

Playwright's Note

Every Brilliant Thing is a collaboration between myself, George Perrin and Jonny Donahoe. It is an adaptation of my short story 'Sleeve Notes', originally written for the Miniaturists and performed by Rosie Thomson at Southwark Playhouse, Theatre503 and the Union Theatre and by myself at Trafalgar Studios, the Old Red Lion and Village Underground, by Gugu Mbatha-Raw at 93 Feet East and by various people at the Latitude Festival. George and I worked for over a decade to turn it into a full-length play. During this time it has been through several incarnations, including an installation created by Paul Burgess and Simon Daw for Scale Project. This particular incarnation was developed with Paines Plough and Pentabus with support from Anne McMeehan and Jim Roberts. The play wouldn't exist were it not for George's persistence, his enthusiasm for the story and his openness to work in an entirely new way.

It also owes a particular debt to Jonny Donahoe who, drawing on his experience as a stand-up comedian, found ways to tell the story and use the audience that George and I couldn't have conceived of. By its nature, the play is different every night and, as such, Jonny essentially co-authored the play while performing it.

This text was published after two years of devising, several trial performances around the UK, runs in Edinburgh and London and a four-month run at the Barrow Street Theatre in NYC. It has been filtered through Jonny's interactions with hundreds of audiences. I've provided footnotes throughout to explain certain aspects of the play in performance and to give examples of some of the things that have happened unexpectedly.



About OSAC The Organization of Saskatchewan Arts Councils (OSAC) acts as an umbrella for community arts councils and schools across the province. Across Saskatchewan, we bring people and the arts together. In more than 80 towns and cities, local arts councils and schools are keeping the arts alive. Thanks to their efforts, those communities enjoy live musical and theatre performances, visual art exhibitions, workshops, and special events.

In the 2023/2024 season, OSAC presented 170 performances by 39 different artists in 35 communities. The School Touring Program offered in-person presentations involving the following disciplines: Music with a Science Component, Cultural Diversity and Awareness, Hoop Dance and Storytelling. The total audience numbers were approximately 25,568 students and teachers. There were four tours, involving 74 schools and travelling to 52 communities throughout the province. Lead teachers in each school contributed approximately 107 non-classroom hours to coordinate these presentations. Fifteen visual and media arts exhibitions toured 57 venues throughout the province and were viewed by over 42,000 people, including approximately 590 tours. Out of the total number of viewers, roughly 1710 people participated in exhibition programming, which included artist talks, hands-on or informational workshops, gallery receptions, and events.

OSAC is a member based eligible provincial cultural organization, funded by Saskatchewan Lotteries. Sask Lotteries is celebrating 50 years as the main fundraiser for more than 12,000 sport, culture and recreation groups in communities across the province! Since 1974, through an agreement with the Government of Saskatchewan, lottery sales in SK have been used to provide more than \$1.4 billion to support athletes from the grassroots level to the international stage, connect youth to artistic experiences, help residents experience the beauty of the parks that cover the province and so much more.
